JOB 1 God's Word Translation

JOB'S CHARACTER

1 A man named Job lived in Uz. He was a man of <u>integrity</u>: He was <u>decent</u>, he <u>feared God</u>, and he <u>stayed away from evil</u>. 2 He had seven sons and three daughters.

JOB'S WEALTH

Estimated at atleast 56 Million dollars 3 He owned 7,000 sheep and goats, 3,000 camels, 1,000 oxen, 500 donkeys, and a large number of servants. He was the most influential person in the Middle East.

JOB'S SPIRITUAL LEADERSHIP

4 His sons used to go to each other's homes, where they would have parties. (Each brother took his turn having a party.) They would send someone to invite their three sisters to eat and drink with them. 5 <u>When they finished having their parties, Job would</u> <u>send for them in order to cleanse them from sin</u>. He would get up early in the morning and sacrifice burnt offerings for each of them. Job thought, "<u>My</u> <u>children may have sinned and cursed God in their</u> <u>hearts.</u>" Job offered sacrifices for them all the time. Wisdom Literature Few parts of the Bible are as theologically rich and yet largely neglected as the Wisdom Literature. While wisdom themes and language appear throughout the Old Testament, they occur in concentrated form in the books of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Job. Today, these books constitute the genre of Wisdom Literature in Protestant Bibles. Ancient Near Eastern Context Wisdom literature is not unique to Israel. Comparable literature is found throughout the ancient Near East, particularly in Egypt. However, Old Testament Wisdom Literature is unique in its insistence that wisdom has one source: Yahweh (Prov 3:19). Wisdom is deeply experiential and concerned with how to live a happy and successful life amid everyday challenges.

Satan answered the Lord, "<u>From wandering all over the earth</u>." 8 The Lord asked Satan, "Have you thought about my servant Job? No one in the world is like him! He is a man of integrity: He is decent, he fears God, and he stays away from evil."9 Satan answered the Lord, "Haven't you given Job a

reason to fear God? 10 Haven't you put a protective fence around him, his home, and everything he has? You have blessed everything he does. His cattle have spread out over the land. 11 But now stretch out your hand, and strike everything he has. I bet he'll curse you to your face."

12 The Lord told Satan, "Everything he has is in your power, but you must not lay a hand on him!" Then Satan left the Lord's presence. Job's First Crisis Satan—his name is given without comment. The feeling with which he looks on Job is similar to that with which he looked on Adam in Paradise: emboldened by his success in the case of one not yet fallen, he is confident that the piety of Job, one of a fallen race, will not stand the test. JOB'S WORSHIP

20 Job stood up, tore his robe in grief, and shaved his head. Then he fell to the ground and worshipped. 21 He said, "Naked I came from my mother, and naked I will return. The Lord has given, and the Lord has taken away! <u>May the name of the Lord be praised.</u>" 22 Through all this Job did not sin or blame God for doing <u>anything wrong.</u>
